

AUTHOR'S PREFACE

In anticipation of the founding of "TiMe" "Transformation in the Mediterranean: 1200–500 BC", a proposed international study group on Transitions in the Mediterranean Area during the First Millennium BC; Professor Manfred Bietak suggested that I should consider contributing a manuscript on Egyptian funerary customs during the Third Intermediate Period for publication, and I am grateful to him, and to the Austrian Academy of Sciences for including this work in their series "*Contributions to the Chronology of the Eastern Mediterranean*".

In essence this is a revised and updated version of a thesis accepted by the Faculty of Arts of the University of Birmingham for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in the Summer of 1987.
